Our college is affiliated to and we adopt the curriculum designed by Savitri Bai Phule University . Depending on our resource potentiality, institutional goals , vision , mission and concern towards the students, we impart quality education using pragmatic and innovative methods. Our institution has developed a well structured and effective way of implementing curriculum. Following are the various means through which the curriculum is executed. Time table committee, Teaching plan, Academic calender , conducting remedial classes and through regular review of the academic records. Time table committee-is responsible for making timetable for each class according to the number of hours prescribed by the PCI . They keep a check on whether the classes are conducted in accordance with the prepared time table, in case ,if any staff is on leave, the members do the necessary changes which helps in smooth conductance of classes and they see to it that no lecture is skipped and students are benefited . If for any reason, syllabus is not completed within the stipulated time, extra classes are arranged for completion by the concerned staff. The academic calendar of the college represents various curricular activities for

the entire year according to the University Calendar, which helps in completing the syllabus and other activities within the stipulated time frame. Teaching plan of each subject is prepared by the concerned staff and is duly signed by the acaedemic dean and the Principal. Academic records are maintained by each and every teacher in which details regarding the topics taken during each lecture is recorded . This academic record is evaluated on daily basis by the concerned head of department and at the end of the year by the Principal of the institution. The faculty is directed by the HOD to design the schedule of theory and practicals, to be conducted for entire semester ,so that the information can be utilized by students and the same is uploaded on website for ready reference. To ensure best quality of teaching, subjects are allocated to teachers according to their expertise and interest, subjects are allocated well before in advance so that the faculty gets himself prepared for conducting lectures and practicals. Research methodology and drug regulatory affairs are the core subjects in curriculum. Pharmacy programmes syllabus in all degree levels (B. Pharmacy, M. Pharmacy & Ph.D.) includes project work for which students are given proper guidance by faculty members of institute . students are explained about the patent laws, intellectual property rights and drug regulation in India and abroad so that they can keep themselves up to date about the new trends and discoveries in the field of research. It empowers the students with the knowledge and skills they need to undertake a research project, explains about literature review, scientific paper writing and presentation. students are directed to publish the research work in reputed national and international journals. All the research oriented topics and recent development in pharma field are displayed on notice board of college so that students can keep abreast of latest happenings in the field of Pharmacy.
